Subcommittee Updates

Prevention & Education Subcommittee

DFC Grant – Elizabeth Thein, DFC Sector Representative

Elizabeth provided an update on the CADCA Mid-Year conference that she and Cyrenica attended on the behalf of the coalition. The conference featured 100+ sessions from the top substance use and misuse prevention experts in the field today and innovative strategies coalitions can implement. Elizabeth and Cyrenica will be providing a more in deep presentation at the next DFC Advisory Meeting on Aug 15th.

SOR Grant – Sue Kahler, SAP Coordinator

Sue provided an update on the State Opioid Response (SOR) grant. At the beginning of the Opioid Educational Kits, seven pharmacies were participating now there are 15 pharmacies. Each pharmacy gives out an opioid education kits to those who are prescribe opioids. Each kit includes a box of Narcan (2 doses), an educational flyer on how to use it and a Deterra bag (dissolves unused medications). During the last Take Back Event May 25th, they collected over 53 pounds of medication. The next upcoming Take Back Event is at Wing Senior Center, August 17th at 10:00am.

Another project they are working on is the AED/Narcan Project. The goal is to have organizations place Narcan with their AED's and to train people in Narcan. 26 organizations agreed to place Narcan with their AED's and 122 Narcan were placed. In July, 54 people were trained in Narcan across 4 organizations. They have another 6 organizations scheduled for training in August. The next free community Narcan training at the North Dakota Safety Council, September 22nd at 7pm.

SAPC Grant – Officer Horne, Bismarck Police Dept

Officer Horne gave an update on the local bar establishments around town who use forensic scanners that can scan 40 to 50 different points on the driver's license. When the bar receives a Fake Id, they will turn it into the Bismarck Police Dept. The police department will send the information to area colleges and the colleges will use

the Student Code of Conduct to determine consequences. 170 Fake IDs have been turned in since the project started in August 2021. Only issue they have had with the scanners is that Montana and California changed their IDs and scanners are picking them up as fake. They are working to address this and update the system. They are also working with local alcohol retail stores to hopefully have them join the project and use the scanners.

Vision Zero - Theresa Liebsch

Theresa gave an update on Vision Zero. Vision Zero strategy aims to establish a culture of personal responsibility where motor vehicle fatalities and serious injuries are recognized as preventable and not tolerated. The mission is to eliminate fatalities and serious injuries caused by motor vehicle crashes. Vision Zero does education at different grade levels. Buckle Up with Bucky educates kindergartens – 6th grade about buckling up the right way. Impact Teen Drivers Presentation, talking to high schoolers 13-19 years old about reckless and distracted driving prevention. Other interactive tools they use to provide education to the community is SIDNE vehicle, pedal go-carts, fatal vision goggles, mini seat belt convincer, drunk/distracted driving computer simulator, virtual reality goggles, roller over simulator and distract-a-match.

Sacred Pipe Resource Center - Cheryl Kary

Cheryl gave an update on Sacred Pipe Resource Center. Their mission is to address the social/cultural, emotional, mental, spiritual, and physical needs of Native people of all Tribes living in the Bismarck-Mandan area and provide a bridge between Native and non-Native people to foster a cohesive community. They center all their work on community engagement, engaging Native Americans families and youth in the community. This summer they did the Leave the Couch Project, it encourages youth to get off their phones and participate in different activities that they might not have been able to attend otherwise. They also have a Community Council that meets once a week and is made up Bismarck-Mandan-Lincoln community members. The Community Councils addresses local issues: Law and Order, Housing & Homelessness, Civic Engagement, and Native Youth.

Nurse-Family Partnership - Jessica Linneman

Jessica gave an update on the Nurse-Family Partnership. The program started in Aug of 2019 as a partnership with Custer Health and Bismarck Burleigh Public Health. The program has 5 registered nurses and currently serving 56 families with the funding to serve 64 families. The goal is to help families with prevention efforts before the children get into schools. The program pairs moms with their own personal nurse at no cost. The nurse will visit the family every other week and will continue visiting the family till the child is two years of age. They found that every \$1 invested into NFP saves \$5.70 in future costs for the highest-risk families served. They also found the following outcomes among participants in the program: 48% reduction in child abuse and neglect, 56% reduction in language delays of child age 21 months, 67% less behavioral/intellectual problems at age 6. For enrollment, moms need to be first time moms and need to be enrolled before they are 29 weeks. Moms can complete the form at nfpmoms.org

Intoxication/Withdrawal Management Subcommittee

Lynden Ring– West Central Human Service Center

Lynden Ring provided an update on West Central Crisis unit. In the month of July, they had 62 individuals come to their facility and 41 of them presented with some form of withdrawal management. There is a strong collaboration with both hospitals and law enforcement on referrals. Another big referral is their mobile deployments and after-hours crisis deployments; staff are meeting individuals in the community, assessing the need, and then getting them over to the facility. Length of stay depends on withdrawal symptoms. They appreciate the partnership with the hospitals and law enforcement.

Brad Brown, West Central Human Service Center

Brad Brown gave an update on the 221-call center. They take calls 24-7, most calls they receive are in the evenings and weekends. From Jan to June 2022, they had 2,383 calls. 57% of calls were crisis intervention.

Dr. Tricia Brown, DNP, APRN, FNP-BC; Legacy Medical - Mosaic Community Triage

Tricia Brown gave an update on the Mosaic Community Triage Center. The goal is to development a medical withdrawal center for any substances and not duplicate services that are already in the community, they want to be an extra step and help in the community. They are looking into buildings that would provide 8 beds with the option for expansion and they are waiting to hear back on three grants that they applied for.

Treatment & Recovery Subcommittee

Cathy Palczewski, Heartview Foundation – Opioid Grant

Cathy gave an update on the Opioid Grant Partnership with Bismarck Police Department, Sanford Health, CHI St. Alexius and Ministry on the Margins. There is three federal approved evidence based best practice medicine for preventing opioid withdrawals. This grant helps bring on doctors to prescribe the medication to patients in the ER, so patients do not leave with acute withdrawals. They will have people on call and available in the ER to help patients and connect them to peer support, and recovery coaches. The recovery coaches are going to make a video that can be played for patients at both hospitals. They are also working with all the colleges to get Narcan training videos placed into some of the buildings on campus.
